Having the bravery and confidence to stand up to an inappropriate request from a superior is both paramount to the moral foundation of society, and extremely difficult. We each know deep down when we are doing right or wrong.

In this text, Vashti's modesty and fearlessness resonated with me. I imagined her recognizing that her husband's demand for her to show her beauty to his drunken friends overstepped his bounds.

Her simple reply, "no," is feared by the male "sages who knew the laws" (Esther 1:13). They advise the king to cast Queen Vashti out and to replace her with a new queen. Here I have represented Vashti dancing alone. I see her living into her refusal with grace and beauty, exhibiting independence and strength in her solitary righteousness.

CALL TO WORSHIP

We gather to worship today as people of faith; Imperfect people who belong to love Forgiven people encircled in grace Hurting people who still have hope Impatient people who thirst for justice

We are shaped in the way of courage, kindness, solidarity, action and the bold proclamation of the gospel's liberating and reconciling promises.

We are faces of faith.

Today, we look to the faith of Queen Vashti. In the book of Esther, Queen Vashti appears only briefly. The first wife of King Ahasuerus, she refuses her husband's summons to parade before his friends at a party and — after the king and his advisors hold an emergency consultation about her shocking insubordination — is summarily banished. This paves the way for the story of Esther to unfold. Queen Vashti's faithful witness is one of strength, bravery and an inspiring confidence in her own worthiness. We honor the faithful witness of Queen Vashti.

Today we look to the faith of Fannie Lou Hamer who rose from humble beginnings in the Mississippi Delta to become one of the most important, passionate, and powerful voices of the civil and voting rights movements and a leader in the efforts for greater economic opportunities for African Americans. In 1964, she and Ruby D. Robinson led the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party in their campaign to be seated at the Democratic National Convention, saying that they and thousands of African-Americans like them were "sick and tired of being sick and tired."

In the midst of the civil rights struggle Fannie Lou Hamer said: "We have to realize just how grave the problem is in the United States today, and I think the sixth chapter of Ephesians, the eleventh and twelfth verses help us to know what it is we are up against. It says, 'Put on the whole armor of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we wrestle not against flesh and blood but against principalities, against powers, and against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places?" Hamer said, "This is what I think about when I think of my own work in the fight for freedom."

We give thanks for faces of faith today. Those who stand firm in the belief that all people have worth. Those who stand up against oppressive power and principalities. Those who pave the way for the powerless and silenced to find true significance and belonging. Those who say no to outdated structures that objectify, silence and control. Those who say yes to dignity, respect, and opportunity for all.

We give thanks for faces of faith yesterday, today, and tomorrow. Amen.

READING Esther 1:10-16, 2:1-4

On the seventh day, when the king was merry with wine, he commanded Mehuman, Biztha, Harbona, Bigtha and Abagtha, Zethar and Carkas, the seven eunuchs who attended him, to bring Queen Vashti before the king wearing the royal crown, in order to show the peoples and the officials her beauty, for she was fair to behold. But Queen Vashti refused to come at the king's command conveyed by the eunuchs. At this the king was enraged, and his anger burned within him.

Then the king consulted the sages who knew the laws (for this was the king's procedure toward all who were versed in law and custom, and those next to him were Carshena, Shethar, Admatha, Tarshish, Meres, Marsena, and Memucan, the seven officials of Persia and Media who had access to the king and sat first in the kingdom): "According to the law, what is to be done with Queen Vashti because she has not performed the command of King Ahasuerus conveyed by the eunuchs?" Then Memucan said in the presence of the king and the officials, "Queen Vashti has done wrong not only to the king but also to all the officials and all the peoples who are in all the provinces of King Ahasuerus.

After these things, when the anger of King Ahasuerus had abated, he remembered Vashti and what she had done and what had been decreed against her. Then the king's servants who attended him said, "Let beautiful young virgins be sought out for the king. And let the king appoint commissioners in all the provinces of his kingdom to gather all the beautiful young virgins to the harem in the citadel of Susa under custody of Hegai, the king's eunuch, who is in charge of the women; let their cosmetic treatments be given them. And let the young woman who pleases the king be queen instead of Vashti." This pleased the king, and he did so.


Since we stand surrounded by all those who have gone before,

SACRED SITE TOURS July 27 (9 am - 1 pm) or August 27 (10 am - 2 pm)

Take advantage of this opportunity to learn about Minnesota history from a Native perspective through story-telling and experiencing the sites in silence / meditation / reflection. **Healing Minnesota Stories Dakota Sacred Sites Tours** are led by **Rev. Jim Bear Jacobs** (Mohican) and **Kelly Sherman Conroy** (Oglala Lakota). On the tour, you'll visit sites located around confluence of the Mississippi and Minnesota rivers, what the Dakota refer to as Bdote, or "meeting place of rivers," including:

- Fort Snelling State Park
- Dakota Internment Camp following the The Dakota-U.S. War
- Pilot Knob Hill, a traditional burial ground.
